- Simon Peter, Andrew, James, and John immediately left their nets and followed Jesus, demonstrating trust and commitment.
- True discipleship requires trust, commitment, and often, sacrifice and reordering of priorities.

- Jesus calls us in the middle of our daily lives, whether at work, home, or in our communities.
- Responding to His call requires immediate and radical commitment, leaving behind anything that hinders our walk with Him.

# 6. Community and Personal Growth:

- o Living out our call involves coming together as a church, supporting each other, and engaging in the means of grace—prayer, Scripture reading, worship.
- Reflecting on our gifts and talents, and how they can be used in service to God's kingdom, helps us find our place within the church's mission.

- Are there "nets" in your life—things that you need to leave behind to follow Him fully?
